Framing the Carlsbad MSR

EARILER MSR

Cataloguing services

Who provides what service, where, at what capacity, and at what cost.
Important work - and largely descriptive.



TODAY's MSR

Making sense of them

Whether services are sufficient to meet community needs today and into the future - and what policy issues sit behind the numbers.

Building the Carlsbad MSR

Before the drafting begins...

1

A workplan priority

The review begins as a priority project in the Commission’s workplan.

2

Scoped by the Executive Officer

To the level of detail needed to inform the Commission’s sphere updates.

3

Project teams on both sides

LAFCO staff and Consultants + City staff.

4

Kickoff, then City Council

Kickoff meeting + optional presentation to Council.

Scoping is where your city has the most influence over its own review.
It is where we decide which services to review and how deeply. For Carlsbad, that meant five functions in depth and others purposefully set aside (i.e., police, trash, etc.).

From Drafting to Adoption



The agency sees it first

The 60-day administrative review is the City’s chance to review before the Commission and public.

Every comment is considered

Technical corrections and fair pushback alike.

Creating Structure + Rules

Set before we reach a single observation, recommendation, or determination



HOW WE LOOK BACK

A five-year data window

Fiscal years 2019 through 2023 for Carlsbad, from the most recent audited financials available - using five-year averages so one unusual year doesn't skew the picture.

Transparency

Any reader can see exactly how an observation was reached and test it for themselves.



HOW WE LOOK FORWARD

A benchmark through 2031

Any sphere, boundary, or out-of-agency service proposal inconsistent with the findings needs an addendum or a new review. This is where the MSR gets its weight.

Engagement

If a rule doesn't fit your city, the best time to tell us is before findings get built on top of it.

Rules and operating premises are listed in writing up front in the Executive Summary.

Applying the Rules + Benchmarking Services

Every function gets the same three-part look

Resources

budget, staffing, rates

Capacity and demand

what the system can handle vs. what is asked of it

Performance

whether those two actually sync up

We also look at: the agency's own five-year trend · per capita measures · national and industry standards · regional peers · adopted agency standards

WASTEWATER: LOOKING BEHIND THE FIRST NUMBER

60% of treatment capacity used at the Encina plant

Ex. wet-weather flows rising much faster than dry-weather flows, and a \$112 million pipeline replacement program depends entirely on continued operating surpluses. The issue isn't capacity - it's aging infrastructure, and how to pay for it.

Making sense of it means asking what it takes to sustain the service.

RECOMMENDATIONS - Carlsbad Municipal Water District



A city shifting from building out to building in

-90% subdivision map activity

+48% discretionary planning applications

4x engineering plan reviews

HOUSING PERFORMANCE

74% of allocation met

Against 59 percent countywide - Carlsbad is doing its part in the aggregate.

5% of the very-low target

The City zoned for housing at every income level - the breakdown occurs downstream, in home values up more than 60 percent and voucher subsidies up 26 percent.

A traditional review might present each of those numbers separately. We try to connect them.

Closing + Discussion

This isn't a document that goes on a shelf

Spheres and study areas

Reaffirmed for both agencies, with special study areas along State Route 78 - plus an offer to help convene conversations on McClellan-Palomar Airport.

The document of record

Through 2031, any boundary change or out-of-agency service request is evaluated against it.

A template

The approach carries forward as we continue the program.

Origins of Proposal

January 2024 UC Berkeley report examined opportunities to improve coordination between LAFCOs and State water regulators.



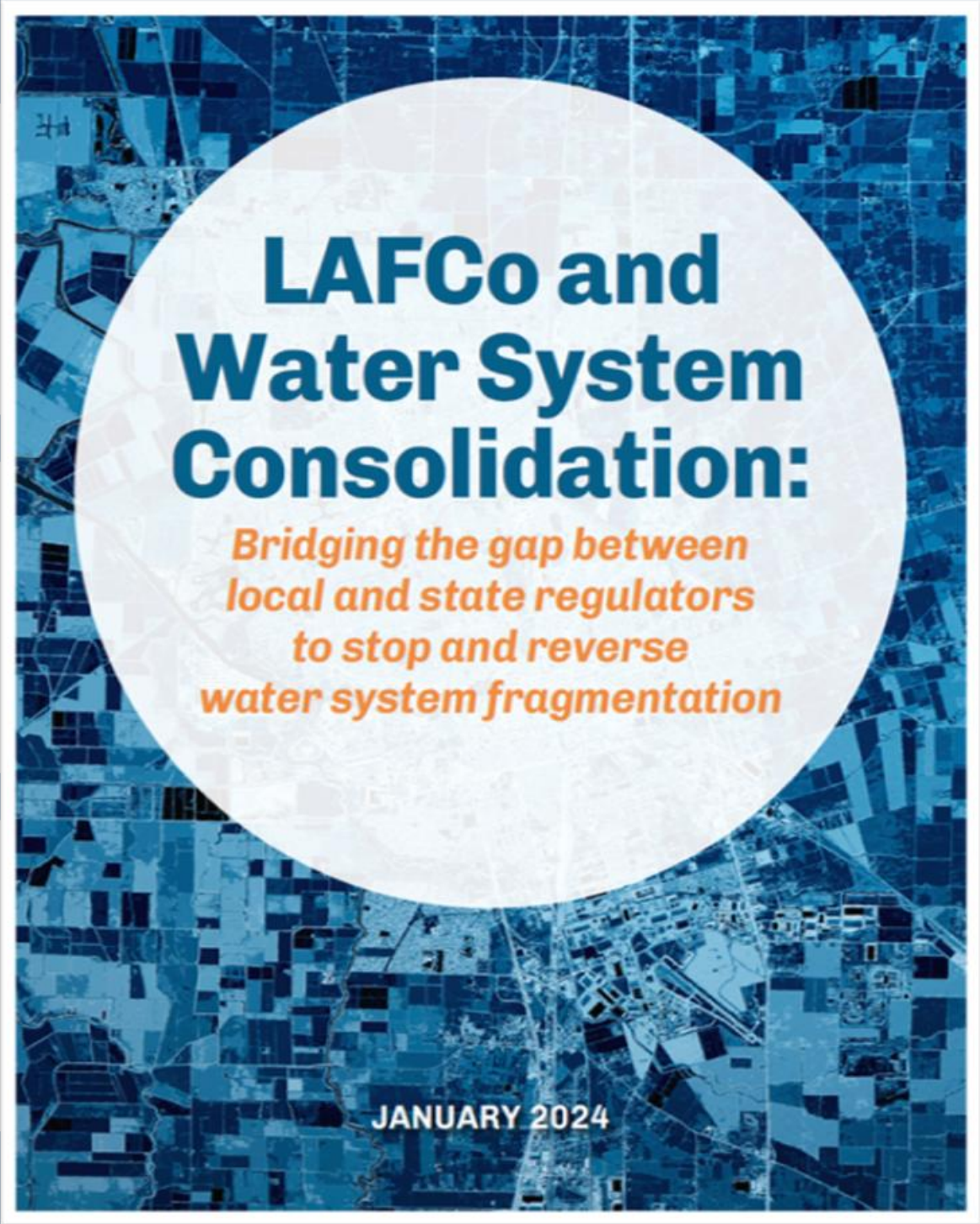
Report Focus: Improve public water systems through consolidations with emphasis on underserved communities.



Key Recommendations: Regular communications between LAFCOs and State water regulators.



MSR Importance: Well-funded MSRs to identify and prioritize consolidations, small system mergers, and seek annexation authority.

Original Legislative Proposal

- **LAFCO-Initiated Remedies**

- Authorize LAFCOs to initiate annexations or approve outside water or wastewater service extensions to address documented public health or safety threats. Initiation would begin the statutory process; it would not guarantee approval of an annexation or service extension.

- **Municipal Service Review Engagement**

- Require LAFCOs to perform and document community outreach before taking final actions; and
- Require subject agencies to respond to MSRs after their own agenda noticing to increase public and local agency engagement.

- **Mobile Home Park Water Systems**

- Amend the definition of mutual water companies to include mobile home parks that operate community water systems, thereby requiring these entities to file service information with LAFCOs.

Commission Direction

- The Commission considered the proposal in February 2026
- Community members expressed concern that expanded initiating authority could fast-track annexations
- Questions also arose about whether communities could be compelled to annex into cities or special districts
- **The Commission directed staff to conduct additional outreach before pursuing legislation**

Restarting with New Approach

- Reconvene the original legislative coalition
- Engage statewide city, water, and special district organizations
- Expand outreach to local agencies and affected stakeholders
- Refine the statutory language and potential safeguards
- Identify areas of support, concern, and potential compromise before seeking authorship in 2027

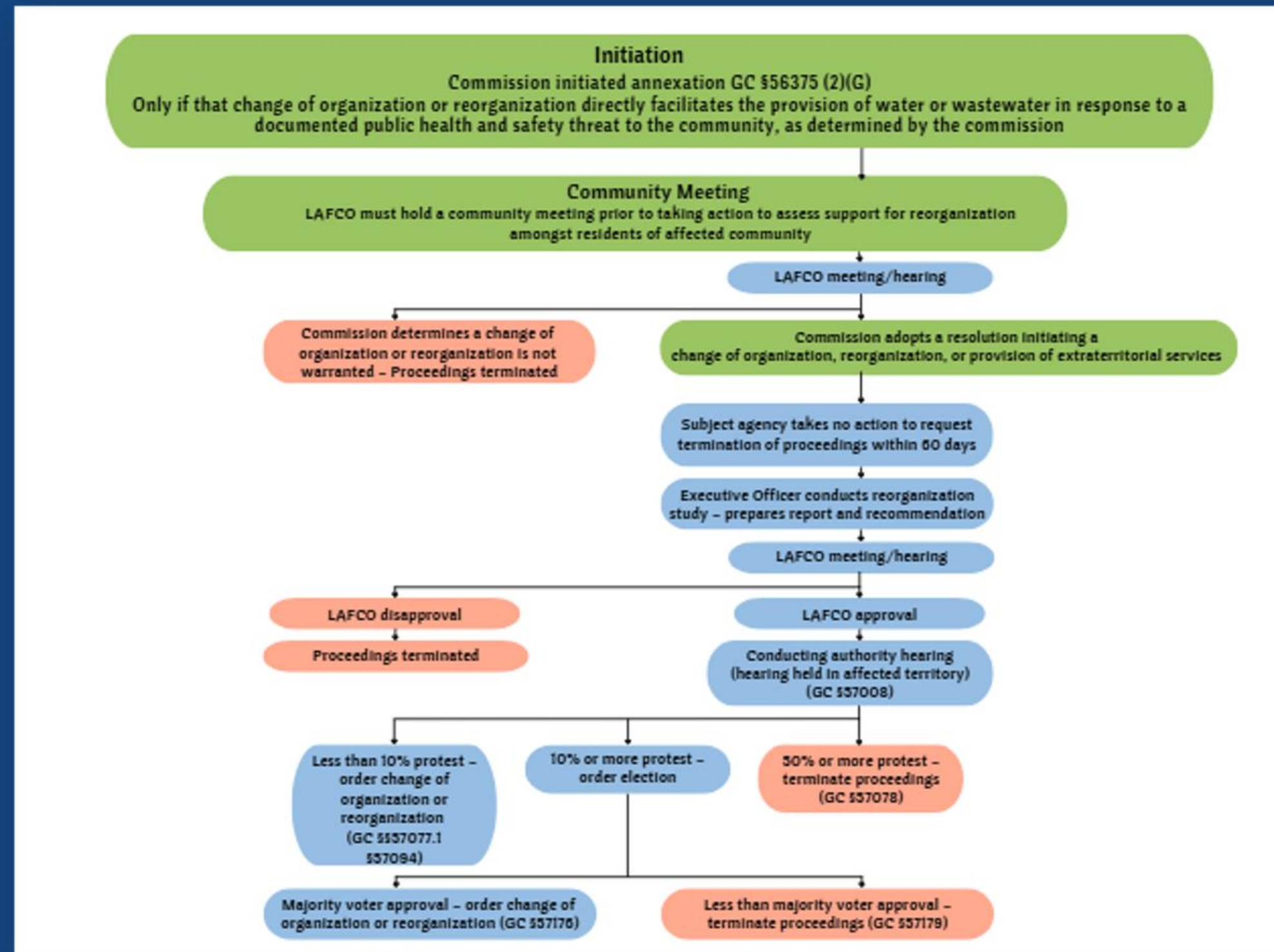
